From the Pastor—July 2024

George Washington was famous for a lot of things. He famously refused to lie, so the story goes, when confronted by his father over a fallen cherry tree. He's famous for his remarkable marriage to the remarkable Martha.



He's famous for his wintry crossing of the Delaware in America's longshot War of Independence. But for all his many accomplishments, George Washington is most famous for being our First President, because when you're a first anything, that's a very big deal.

When America's founders were first envisioning the presidency, some imagined a king-like office, or more appropriately, a kinglight office. Short of sporting a crown and scepter, the president, some thought, should bear some resemblance to the King of England. It was Alexander Hamilton (I think) who suggested that the president ought to be addressed as "Your Excellency." Washington, though, would have none of it. He opted, instead, to be referred to as simply "Mr. President." In putting down the infamous Whiskey Rebellion, Washington exercised plenty of presidential muscle (including riding at the head of an army formed to suppress the tax rebels), but stopped well short of tyranny in enforcing federal law. But most famously, in my humble opinion, at the end of his second term, Washington did not cling to the presidency, but stepped aside, clearing the way for the eventual election of John Adams and, most importantly, establishing the hallmark of American democracy, the peaceful transfer of power.

I like to think of St. Paul as Christianity's First Pastor. While Paul most consistently referred to himself as an apostle or servant of Christ, he certainly did a lot of pastoring in that first generation of Christian existence. The word pastor comes from the Latin translation of the Creek word for shepherd, and much of Paul's ministry was devoted to keeping his sheep from wandering away from the good news of God in Christ. As 21stcentury Christians, we have a foundation of 21 centuries of Christian tradition, but our first-century forebears had no such advantage. The first Christian communities were operating without the creeds and constitutions we take for granted. They had no service books with liturgies for celebrating the sacraments.

While there were oral traditions of Jesus' teaching and preaching, these first Christians did not have the written words of the New Testament. The first Gospel (likely Mark's) would not begin to circulate until nearly a decade after Paul's death. Consequently, Paul's letters abound with many of the questions and quarrels of believers who were trying to figure out what it means to be the Body of Christ.

Some of the controversies Paul addressed in his letters might strike us as peculiar. These days we don't much quibble over whether or not it is permissible to eat meat sacrificed to idols. On the other hand, Paul also took on issues still relevant to us today, such as: sexual ethics, marriage-divorce-andremarriage, and church discipline. But in guiding his fellow believers in all these various debates, Paul consistently and persistently goes back to the Cross of Christ. Every question (or accusation!) thrown at Paul was seen through and addressed in the light of what God has done for us in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. And herein lies the fundamental template for pastoral leadership.

In this last generation, as the church's challenges have grown, so have the pastor's roles and responsibilities. Besides teacher, preacher, presider, and caregiver, the church often calls the pastor to other tasks, such as administrator, fundraiser, conflict manager, visionary, and long-range planner. But going back to Paul, the pastor's first responsibility in every issue, question, or problem that the church faces or might face is to bring the Gospel to bear. Whatever the concern or dispute, the pastor's duty is to raise the question: How do we show forth the grace and goodness showered on us in the sacrifice of Christ Jesus?

"SCUBA - Diving into Friendship with God!" Students will dive deep into an amazing undersea adventure where they'll experience the ever-flowing, never-ending love of God!


