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#### From the Pastor, June—2024

Martin Marty is a national treasure. He began his career as a Lutheran pastor, and in 1963 joined the faculty of the University of Chicago, mostly teaching American church history, mostly in the Divinity School. He would write a book and edit a book each year of his 35-year career at Chicago, while also advising a total of 130 graduate students during his tenure. Altogether, he's authored 60 books and coauthored, edited, or contributed to hundreds more, including a massive five-volume series on fundamentalism. According to his website, his name appears on 5,000 articles. He's served as president of the American Academy of Religion, the American Society of Church History, and the American Catholic Historical Association. And at age 96, Martin Marty is still going strong, writing columns, podcasting, and being a faithful ELCA member. Because of his vast knowledge of the American church, he's become more than just another distinguished academic. He's a trusted voice, whose insights have shaped leaders and their leadership for decades.

I first heard Dr. Marty speak at Tulane University when I was an intern (vicar) at Grace Lutheran Church in New Orleans. That was a while ago (no kidding, huh!), and I wish I could remember the theme of his lecture, but during the question-and-answer period that followed, he said something that's stuck with me all these years. He was asked where he saw the American church heading (bear in mind, this was 40+ years ago.) Dr. Marty answered that he saw the church transitioning from a church of convention to a church of intention.

A conventional church, he explained, is a church driven by social norms. For most of America's history, church was just what you did on Sunday mornings. It was part and parcel of being a good citizen or a moral person. If you didn't go to church, people might talk about you, maybe think that you were an atheist or possibly a communist. If you aspired to public office, people would want to know what church, or possibly, what synagogue, you belonged to, because in the America of the conventional church, you were either a Catholic, a Protestant, or a Jew. If you weren't any one of those three, you were – God help you! --weird.

If the mortal sin of the conventional church is weirdness, the church of intention is willing to risk a little weirdness for the sake of faithfulness.

People attend the intentional church not just because that's what they or their parents or grandparents have always done; rather, they show up because they see their participation in the faith community as part of following Jesus. And if in the course of following Jesus, the church of intention challenges social norms contrary to the spirit of the gospel – like racism or sexism – that's okay. In fact, that's to be expected of the intentional church, even if there's societal pushback. In the intentional church, it's taken for granted that discipleship comes with a cost (see Mark 8:34).

Many of the social factors that supported and sustained the conventional church have fallen away, or at least, are in rapid decline. If, once upon a time in America, it was considered weird not to attend Sunday service, in many parts of America today people might think you weird for attending church. On my Sunday commutes to St. John's, most of the traffic is heading for the soccer fields and ballparks, not to Sunday worship. Not so long ago, the ministry was considered a highly respected profession, but after a decades-long string of highly publicized clergy scandals, all pastors – fair or unfair – have been painted with a very broad brush.

In seminary, my favorite church history professor was Dr. Carl Volz, now of sacred memory. He didn't write as many books or articles as Martin Marty, but he had an encyclopedic knowledge of the church's history, especially that of the early church. In one of his books, Dr. Volz took on a huge question: How did the early church survive? After all, these Christians stuck out like a sore thumb from the rest of pagan society. Talk about weird! They didn't take part in any of the local temple rites or celebrations. They didn't offer sacrifice to the emperor. They were routinely charged with bringing bad luck and being bad citizens. If anything bad happened in a city or town - a fire, a plague, a dreadful crime - the Christians were the first to be blamed. They were persecuted locally and eventually imperially. How did they survive, much less thrive? Dr. Volz wrote that Christian survival came down to three things: (1) their commitment to apostolic teaching; (2) their witness in the face of persecution and martyrdom; and (3) their love for and service to the poorest of their communities. Sounds like a church of intention.

#### Update from the Quilters:

After many weeks of hard work, the Quilters of St. John's would like to share the fruits of their most recent labor of love with the congregation. A small, but very productive group of volunteers, our quilters will have 11 quilts on display in the sanctuary on Sunday, June 2nd before they get packed up for shipment to Poland.

Why Poland? Since millions of refugees have fled into Poland from Ukraine in response to the ongoing war, two women started a charity they call, "Wrap Ukraine with Quilts." Providing donated quilts to these refugees is their primary goal, however they have also started a workshop in Poland to teach sewing and quilting skills to interested Ukrainian refugee women. Making finished quilts that the refugees can eventually sell for income is one addition goal of this unique and desperately needed charity.




